COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course focuses on preparing policymakers and professionals in health-related fields to navigate complex global health policy, advocacy, and diplomacy.

It covers topics such as global health governance, public policy making in global health, advocacy methods and strategies for health, intersectoral approaches to health policy and advocacy, such as health and foreign policy and health and climate change.

The program extends over a five-day period, incorporating lectures, a simulation exercise, case studies, and visits to prominent organizations.



COURSE DESCRIPTION

The summer school focuses on assistive technologies aimed at maintaining good health and quality of life for the ageing population. It addresses the increasing challenges posed by physiological limitations and the need for innovations supporting elderly individuals.

The course covers theoretical foundations, design considerations, and ethical aspects related to assistive technologies. Through lectures, case studies, debates, and group work, participants learn about various assistive technologies, data sensing, ethical considerations, and best practices in designing and implementing such solutions.

The program emphasizes interdisciplinarity, collaboration, and end-user participation, adopting a human-centered design approach. The course, taught in English by academic experts, incorporates use-case and project-based learning, providing both theoretical knowledge and practical implementation experience.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This Summer School aims to deepen students' knowledge about citizenship and the politics of contention and to strengthen their engagement with research questions and their capacity to deliver fully-fledged papers and presentations.

The course is structured around five more specific issues relating to the general topic of the Summer School and their implications for citizenship:

- · Organized vs spontaneous contention
- · Individual vs collective forms of contention
- · Particularistic vs universalist contention
- · Online vs offline contention
- · Contention in democracies vs autocracies

Each topic will be addressed on a different weekday. Teaching is based on lectures, assigned readings, group work, presentations, and discussions. Students will be assessed based on a written assignment and the related presentation.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Each day focuses on a specific theme, including global health and the international drug control system, challenges of access to essential medicines, cannabis regulation models, tobacco markets, and global governance scenarios.

The course aims to help students understand health and human rights issues related to drug use and policy, analyze the international drug control regime's implications, and explore solutions for better governance.

Students will participate in group presentations, addressing the requirements and conditions for effective drug policies and the roles of stakeholders at various levels.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Summer School "Listen, Engage, Connect: Explore The Science Communication Arena" aims to provide a comprehensive overview of the key principles and strategies of science communication in the current global context.

The program will cover a range of topics, including writing and storytelling for a lay audience, curating dialogues for impact, navigating fake news and alternative facts, risk communication and community engagement, the relationship between science and society, the neural basis of decision-making and strategies for building strong public relations between politics and academic institutions.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This summer school addresses the pervasive issues of prejudice and discrimination in contemporary societies. It brings together experts and students from various countries to explore the origins, consequences, and ways to counteract prejudice.

The program includes lectures by keynote speakers in social psychology, complemented by talks from other disciplines like law, economics, gender studies, etc. Participants engage in individual readings, class discussions, group exercises, and presentations, focusing on prejudice related to ethnic origin, religion, gender, sexual orientation, age, social class, disability, and unemployment.

The course provides a unique opportunity to learn from practitioners in Geneva, discussing implemented policies aimed at reducing discrimination and promoting workplace diversity. Students will gain a deep understanding of the concepts and theories related to prejudice, discrimination, and diversity, critically analyze societal phenomena, identify prevention policies, and deliver presentations on specific forms of discrimination.

This Geneva Summer School offers a unique opportunity for early-career researchers, policy professionals, and civil society actors to engage in the science-policy interface related to environmental governance.

The program focuses on exploring how science-policy interfaces function in practice, understanding the models and actors involved, and developing essential skills for effective engagement.

Participants will receive practical advice from experts and practitioners, and participate in interactive sessions, lectures, round tables, and case studies.

The course covers topics such as environmental governance systems, boundary-spanning skills, and potential career paths in the science-policy interface. It provides a platform for networking with professionals from the international Geneva ecosystem, fostering collaboration and knowledge exchange for addressing complex environmental challenges.
